

SUMMER SCHOOL

Two six-week summer sessions will again be offered this year, the first beginning on June 6, the second on July 18. Courses running through both halves are: PRINCIPLES OF

GEOGRAPHY, Dr. Olson; CARTOG-RAPHY, Mr. Burnham; POLITI-CAL GEOGRAPHY, Dr. Olson: During the second half Dr. Lougee will teach PRINCIPLES OF PHYSI-OGRAPHY and GEOGRAPHY OF NEW ENGLAND; also during the second half Dr. Van Valkenburg will teach CLIMATOLOGY and PRESENT EUROPEAN PROBLEMS.

STAFF ACTIVITIES

Dr. Van Valkenburg, attending the Lisbon International Geography Conference, writes that his plan for a world inventory has been well received. He has been appointed chairman of a committee to study further the possibilities of the inventory and agree on mapping scales and keys. A meeting of the committee, which includes Pierre Gourou (France), Leo Waibel (Brazil), Dudley Stamp (Gt. Britain), and Hans Boesch (Switz.) is scheduled at Clark in December. Guests at Dr. Van's Clark dinner at Lisbon included Mr. and Mrs. Raisz, Mr. and Mrs. Foscue, Mr. and Mrs. Boesch, Virginia Robinson, Messrs, Cressev, Brammell Atwood, Ir., Trueblood, Cain. Barnes, Adkinson, Fawcett, and Burrill. The conference over, Dr. Van is now studying changes in Europe since the war and will be back in time for summer school.

Dr. Ekblaw, after returning to full time duties in the second semester, has been recently confined with a broken rib suffered while coughing. This Spring he delivered a paper entitled "The History of Indian Groups on Cape Cod in Colonial Time" before the Nipmuck Chapter of the Mass. Archeological Society.

Dr. Raymond E. Murphy attended a meeting of the Committee on Economic Geography of the A.G.S. at Evanston, Ill. in February. The committee is preparing a chapter for the volume which is to be published in commemoration of the 100th anniversary of the American Geographical

Society. Also in February, at the Seventh Pacific Science Congress at Auckland, his paper entitled "Changing Patterns of Agriculture in the Easternmost Caroline Islands" was read in absentia before a symposium on Changing Agricultural Economy of the Pacific Islands, "High and Low Islands in the Eastern Carolines" will appear in a coming edition of GEOGRAPHICAL REVIEW, and "The Economic Geography of a Micronesian Atoll" has been completed and submitted for publication. This summer Dr. Murphy will teach at the University of Colorado.

Dr. Richard J. Lougee has been traveling to Harvard University twice a week to teach Glacial Geology, including field trips in the Boston basin. On April 29 and 30, he represented the department at the New York State Geographical Association's meeting at the New York State College for Teachers in Buffalo. He will teach at Clark during the second half of the summer term and then direct the Fall Field Camp which is expected to be held in Bristol County. Mass. Friends of Dr. Lougee will be pleased to know that son Jerry has been recovering rapidly from his accident and is now able to ride his bicycle.

Dr. Henry J. Warman will teach this summer at the University of British Columbia, Vancouver. The course is entitled "Introductory Human and Economic Geography" and has been carefully planned for teachers, emphasizing content in the first half and method of teaching this same material in the second half. This past year he has added to his duties the task of consultant in Geography at the secondary level in the public schools of Quincy, Mass. Mr. Burnham will teach the Cartography classes during both parts of the Summer term.

VISITING LECTURERS

Again this semester the regular schedule of courses in the geography school has been enriched by courses and lectures by visitors.

Dr. Sidman Poole, Head of the School of Geography of the University of Virginia, traced the development of military geography from ancient times to the present in a series of lectures delivered here during the first week in February. Dr. Poole also led a seminar on the subject of the new nation of Israel.

Dr. John C. Ayers and Mr. Harry J. Turner of the Woods Hole Oceanographic Institute have conducted a course in Oceanography during the second semester. The lecturers have drawn interesting parallels between the physics of the water masses and the more familiar air masses. Economic aspects of the world's fisheries and the potential resources of the oceans were also among the subjects discussed. This is the first time in many years that a course in Oceanography has been offered.

On February 16 Clark played host to the well known geologist and author, William H. Hobbs, emeritus Professor and Chairman of the Department of Geology at the University of Michigan. Dr. Hobbs spoke on "The Pleistocene Glaciers of North America," and illustrated his lecture with slides.
