The Monadnock is regularly published twice a year in December and May, by the Clark University Geographical Society, Worcester, Massachusetts.

Dr. Samuel Van Valkenburg will leave for Europe in early summer to continue investigations of land use. On this trip his study will be concentrated in Austria. Dr. Van will attend the Stockholm meetings of the International Geographical Union before returning to guide the Graduate School of Geography through another year.

In June and July, Dr. Raymond E. Murphy will teach at the University of Nebraska. He plans to depart for Europe in late July and, after the I.G.U. meetings present a paper at an urban symposium at Lund.

Dr. Henry J. Warman plans to teach weather and climate at the Clark University intersession then move on to the University of Colorado's Workshop in Geography. Later in the summer he will fly to Stockholm. The trip back will probably be via the polar route to Los Angeles, then by car to Worcester.

Dr. Richard J. Lougee was forced to give up his classroom teaching early in the new year because of cancer. Hospitalized for many weeks, his illness has left him undaunted. Students, even those new to Clark, will long remember his clear presentation of complex geomorphic and physiographic phenomena. No one will forget the Christmas party where he

was presented with the lyle-detector machine. Unfortunately, the presentation of his glacial theories at the Stockholm meetings had to be cancelled. The Monadnock and Workroom gang wish this kind man and noble scholar our best wishes for better health.

The visiting Professor this semester is Dr. Erwin Raisz, who is teaching aerial photo and map interpretation as well as physiography. Many of us have marveled while watching Dr. Raisz produce landform diagrams and become frustrated at our own attempts.

Dr. Hans Carol will leave for Switzerland and, in August. visit Stockholm. Later in the summer he will bring his family to the U.S. where he has accepted a position at the University of Cincinnati. The CUGS are fortunate to have had the opportunity to study under the guidance of excellent geographers, but not all can remain with us for more than a vear or two. Workroom members of the past two years will remember Dr. Carol as "master" of our studies in Field Techniques, Africa, Land Use and the APLU (agrophysical land unit). We wish him the best in his new academic venture and hope that his stay in this country may be long and pleasant.

ALUMNI ACTIVITIES

Of over 500 questionnaires sent out last Fall, about 170 were returned. Included in the response were generous contributions so necessary for the publication of this and the December issue.
